INTERCOLLEGIATE FISHING MATCH

PROCEDURES

- 1. All team members, coaches, and officials are required to attend the evening programs which start promptly at 8:00 p.m. at the auditorium of the Wedgeport School.
- 2. At 7:45 (including first night) team captains will meet with the officials in a classroom at the school.
- 3. Following the last lecture each evening, announcements will be made concerning the next day's fishing grounds, species, time, etc.
- 4. The sole determining factor in designating fishing grounds, species and time will be the consensus of opinion of boat captains, crews, and the official judges of the Seminar. (Decisions are based on weather conditions, tides, evidence or abundance of individual species in individual areas and whatever will be best for the teams.)
- 5. Fishing may fall into three divisions depending on No. 4.
 - A. BLUEFIN or GIANT TUNA, chumming Soldier's Rip or trolling Tusket River.
 - B. POLLOCK, trolling with artificial lures along certain isolated ledges and shoal areas.
 - C. COD, HADDOCK, HALIBUT, bottom fishing with jigs or bait in specified localities.
- 6. If the fishing is unusually good for A, B or C in No. 5 the judges may decide to allow greater emphasis or entire effort on any species.
- 7. For the third day's fishing, the judges may allow each team to make its own decision regarding species to be sought and area to be fished. However, no boat will be allowed to go off alone. The minimum number of boats in a group to fish any area is three. Safety factors are involved. Further discussion at Captains' meetings.
- 8. No guests allowed on team boats. If a photographer or writer wishes to board a team boat in order to obtain material he must receive permission from the judges boat and permission from the team coach.
- 9. Immediately upon docking all fish will be weighed by the weighmaster and recorded by the score keeper.
- 10. Fish will not be weighed in barrels. A crate will be weighed first and then the barrel of fish will be dumped into the crate. Tuna, of course, will be hauled up by chain mechanism.

SCORING RULES

- 1. One point per pound of fish regardless of species.
- 2. Team accumulating most points wins the Match and is awarded the Hulman Trophy for one year.
- 3. Team catching the largest fish is awarded the Crandall Trophy for one year.
- 4. The R.J. Schaefer International Trophy is awarded for one year to the group of schools (U.S. or Canada) gaining most points.

TEAM RULES

TUNA FISHING

- 1. Not more than two rods employed simultaneously. A rotation system is set up by the coach whereby each team member shares equally in time on the rods. Suggested time is 15 minutes per change. Team captains keep time. The two rods are situated on the sides of the angler's chair. One man is in the chair for 15 minutes and is assigned one rod. If the other rod hooks a fish the man in the chair hops out and allows his teammate to come into the chair.
- 2. The coach, boat captain, or his crew may not take the angler's place in the chair as an aid in fighting a tuna.
- 3. There are no restrictions concerning assistance given to the angler in the chair, including handling of harness, rod and reel by teammates. If the angler fighting a fish becomes tired he may be substituted by a teammate. The fish will not be disqualified for scoring.
- 4. Boat crews are responsible for chumming, rigging baits, gaffing the tuna, and advising the anglers at all times.

POLLOCK FISHING

- 1. Not more than 4 anglers trolling at one time; 5th man gaffs the fish.
- 2. Rotation system is set up by the coach and timed by the team captain.
- 3. Team members may assist each other in any way possible.
- 4. The coach, boat captain, or his mates may not fish, handle the gaff, remove hooks from fish, or place fish in barrel.





PROCEDURES

- 1. All team members, coaches, and officials are required to attend the evening programs which start promptly at 8:00 p.m. at the auditorium of the Wedgeport School.
- 2. At 7:45 (including first night) team captains will meet with the officials in a classroom at the school.
- 3. Following the last lecture each evening, announcements will be made concerning the next day's fishing grounds, species, time, etc.
- 4. The sole determining factor in designating fishing grounds, species and time will be the consensus of opinion of boat captains, crews, and the official judges of the Seminar. (Decisions are based on weather conditions, tides, evidence or abundance of individual species in individual areas and whatever will be best for the teams.)
- 5. Fishing may fall into three divisions depending on No. 4.
 - A. BLUEFIN or GIANT TUNA, chumming Soldier's Rip or trolling Tusket River.
 - B. POLLOCK, trolling with artificial lures along certain isolated ledges and shoal areas.
 - C. COD, HADDOCK, HALIBUT, bottom fishing with jigs or bait in specified localities.
- 6. There shall be only one kind of fishing permitted at a time: tuna, ground fishing or mackerel fishing, but no combination thereof.
- 7. If the fishing is unusually good for A, B or C in No. 5 the judges may decide to allow greater emphasis or entire effort on any species.
- 8. For the third day's fishing, the judges may allow each team to make its own decision regarding species to be sought and area to be fished. However, no boat will be allowed to go off alone. The minimum number of boats in a group to fish any area is three. Safety factors are involved. Further discussion at Captains' meetings.
- 9. No guests allowed on team boats. Five qualified team members and one coach will constitute the maximum delegation from any one college (in all activities). If a photographer or writer wishes to board a team boat in order to obtain material he must receive permission from the judges boat and permission from the team coach.
- 10. Immediately upon docking all fish will be weighed by the weighmaster and recorded by the score keeper.
- ll. Fish will not be weighed in barrels. A crate will be weighed first and then the barrel of fish will be dumped into the crate. Tuna, of course, will be hauled up by chain mechanism.

SCORING RULES

- 1. One point per pound of fish regardless of species.
- 2. Team accumulating most points wins the Match and is awarded the Hulman Trophy for one year.
- 3. Team catching the largest fish is awarded the Crandall Trophy for one year.
- 4. The R. J. Schaefer International Trophy is awarded for one year to the group of schools (U.S. or Canada) gaining most points.

TEAM RULES

TUNA FISHING

- 1. Not more than two rods employed simultaneously. A rotation system is set up by the coach whereby each team member shares equally in time on the rods. Suggested time is 15 minutes per change. Team captains keep time. The two rods are situated on the sides of the angler's chair. One man is in the chair for 15 minutes and is assigned one rod. If the other rod hooks a fish the man in the chair hops out and allows his teammate to come into the chair.
- 2. The coach, boat captain, and crew members may not take the angler's place in the chair as an aid in fighting a tuna.
- 3. There are no restrictions concerning assistance given to the angler in the chair, including handling of harness, rod and reel by teammates. If the angler fighting a fish becomes tired he may be substituted by a teammate. The fish will not be disqualified for scoring.
- 4. Boat crews are responsible for chumming, rigging baits, gaffing the tuna, and advising the anglers at all times.

POLLOCK FISHING

- 1. Not more than 4 anglers trolling at one time; 5th man gaffs the fish.
- 2. Rotation system is set up by the coach and timed by the team captain.
- 3. Team members may assist each other in any way possible.
- 4. The coach, boat captain, and crew members may not fish, handle the gaff, remove hooks from fish, or place fish in barrel.

- 5. If a team is shy a man due to mal de mer (or other cause) the coach may gaff the fish.
- 6. Boat crew may assist in choosing and rigging lures.
- 7. Lures are not to contain more than a single hook or a single treble hook. One lure per line. Hand line may not be used.
- 8. Teams are encouraged to use their own lures and tackle. However, lures will be handed out at the meeting and some may be provided by the boat crews.
- 9. In pollock fishing the use of tuna tackle is prohibited; otherwise no restrictions on rod, reel, or line of reasonable size.
- 10. A short-handed gaff is part of the boat's equipment; no other may be used.

BOTTOM FISHING

Rules 1 through 5 same as POLLOCK.

- 6. Not more than two single hooks baited or one lure holding either a single hook or one treble hook allowed per line. Hand-line may not be used.
- 7. A 9 oz. lure is the heaviest lure permitted for bottom fishing. Any lure weighing more than 9 oz. is illegal.
- 8. In mackerel fishing only the fifth man may use a handline; the handline to hold a single lure with single hooks or one treble hook.
- 9. Team members must cut bait and bait own hooks. (Man with gaff usually cuts bait).
- 10. Coach may fish but must return fish to water.

These rules have been drawn up from years of experience, trial and error, and we hope that each member of each team and its coach accepts them in a spirit of good sportsmanship and friendly cooperation.

It is up to the teams to decide what kind of fishing they shall do during free portions of the Match. The boat captains can be consulted for their opinions, but the final decision rests with the teams. Once the decision has been made, the boat captains should be informed and then asked to proceed to the area which in their opinion holds the most promise for the specific type of fishing decided upon.

The boat captains should not themselves consult with the judges boat about rules questions. If a team decides it must have a question answered before the next captains and coaches meeting, then the <u>coach</u> of the team should get on the radio and put the question directly to one of the judges.

FISHING MATCH PROCEDURES

- 1. All team members, coaches, and officials are required to attend the evening programs which start promptly at 8:30 p.m. at the Grand Hotel salon adjacent to the lobby. FIFTY POINTS DEDUCTED FROM TEAM SCORE FOR EACH TEAM MEMBER OR COACH NOT IN ATTENDANCE.
- 2. At 7:30 (first night) team captains and coaches will meet with the officials in Hotel salon and at 8:00 the following two nights.
- 3. Following the last lecture each evening, announcements will be made concerning the next day's fishing grounds, species, time, etc.
- 4. The sole determining factor in designating fishing grounds, species and time will be the consensus of boat captains, crews, and the official judges of the Seminar. (Decisions are based on weather conditions, tides, evidence or abundance of individual species in individual areas and whatever will be best for the teams.)
- 5. Fishing may fall into four divisions depending on No. 4.
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 - D. MACKEREL, fishing with small jigs in Tusket River.
- 6. There shall be only one kind of fishing permitted at a time: tuna, ground fishing or mackerel fishing, but no combination thereof.
- 7. If the fishing is unusually good for A, B, C or D in No. 5 the judges may decide to allow greater emphasis or entire effort on any species.
- 8. For the third day's fishing, the judges may allow each tem to make its own decision regarding species to be sought and area to be fished. However, no boat will be allowed to go off alone. The minimum number of boats in a group to fish any area is three. Safety factors are involved. Further discussion at Captains' meetings.
- 9. No guests allowed on team boats. Five qualified team members and one coach will constitute the maximum delegation from any one college (in all activities). If a photographer or writer wishes to board a team boat in order to obtain material he must receive permission from the judges and the team coach.
- 10. Immediately upon docking all fish will be weighed by the weighmaster and recorded by the score keeper.
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SCORING RULES

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The boat captains should not themselves consult with the judges' boat about rules questions. If a team decides it must have a question answered before the next captains and coaches meeting, then the <u>coach</u> of the team should get on the radio and put the question directly to one of the judges.





- 1. All team members, coaches, and officials are required to attend the evening programs which start promptly at 8:30 p.m. at the Grand Hotel. FIFTY POINTS DEDUCTED FROM TEAM SCORE FOR EACH TEAM MEMBER OR COACH NOT IN ATTENDANCE.
- 2. At 7:30 (first night) team captains and coaches will meet with the officials in Hotel salon and at 8:00 the following two nights.
- 3. Following the last lecture each evening, announcements will be made concerning the next day's fishing grounds, species, time, etc.
- 4. The sole determining factor in designating fishing grounds, species and time will be the consensus of boat captains, crews, and the official judges of the Seminar. (Decisions are based on weather conditions, tides, evidence or abundance of individual species in individual areas and whatever will be best for the teams.)
- 5. Fishing may fall into four divisions depending on No. 4.
 - A. BLUEFIN or GIANT TUNA, chumming Soldier's Rip or trolling Tusket River.
 - B. POLLOCK, trolling with artificial lures along certain isolated ledges and shoal area.
 - C. COD, HADDOCK, HALIBUT, bottom fishing with jigs or bait in specified localities.
 - D. MACKEREL, fishing with small jigs in Tusket River.
- 6. There shall be only one kind of fishing permitted at a time: tuna, ground fishing or mackerel fishing, but no combination thereof.
- 7. If the fishing is unusually good for A, B, C or D in No. 5 the judges may decide to allow greater emphasis or entire effort on any species.
- 8. For the second and third day's fishing, the judges may allow each team to make its own decision regarding species to be sought and area to be fished. However, no boat will be allowed to go off alone. The minimum number of boats in a group to fish any area is three. Safety factors are involved. Further discussion at Captains' meetings.
- 9. Positively no guests allowed on team boats. Five qualified team members and one coach will constitute the maximum delegation from any one college (in all activities). If a photographer or writer wishes to board a team boat in order to obtain material he must receive permission from the judges and the team coach.
- 10. Immediately upon docking all fish will be weighed by the judges and recorded by the score keeper.
- 11. Fish will not be weighed in barrels. A crate will be weighed first and then the barrel of fish will be dumped into the crate. Tuna, of course, will be hauled up by chain mechanism.

SCORING RULES

- 1. One point per pound of fish regardless of species.
- 2. Team accumulating most points wins the Match and is awarded the Hulman Trophy for one year.
- 3. Team catching the largest fish is awarded the Crandall Trophy for one year.
- 4. The R.J. Schaefer International Trophy is awarded for one year to the group of schools (U.S. or Canada) gaining most points.

TEAM RULES

TUNA FISHING

- 1. Not more than two rods employed simultaneously. A rotation system is set up by the coach whereby each team member shares equally in time on the rods. Suggested time is 15 minutes per change. Team captains keep time. The two rods are situated on the sides of the angler's chair. One man is in the chair for 15 minutes and is assigned one rod. If the other rod hooks a fish the man in the chair hops out and allows his teammate to come into the chair.
- 2. The coach, boat captain, and crew members may not take the angler's place in the chair as an aid in fighting a tuna.
- 3. There are no restrictions concerning assistance given to the angler in the chair by his teammates, including handling of harness, rod and reel. If the angler fighting a fish becomes tired he may be substituted by a teammate. The fish will not be disqualified for scoring. Damaged tackle will not disqualify a fish.
- 4. Boat crews are responsible for chumming, rigging baits, gaffing the tuna, and advising the anglers at all times.

POLLOCK FISHING

- 1. Not more than 4 anglers trolling at one time; 5th man gaffs the fish.
- 2. Rotation system is set up by the coach and timed by the team captain.
- 3. Team members may assist each other in any way possible.
- 4. The coach, boat captain, and crew members may not fish, handle the gaff, remove hooks from fish, or place fish in barrel.

- 5. If a team is shy a man due to mal de mer (or other cause) the coach may gaff the fish.
- 6. Boat crew may assist in choosing and rigging lures.
- 7. Lures are not to contain more than a single hook or a single treble hook. One lure per line. Hand line may not be used unless rod or reel breaks and another is not available.
- 8. In pollock fishing the use of tuna tackle is prohibited; otherwise no restrictions on rod, reel, or line of reasonable size.
- 9. A short-handed gaff is part of the boat's equipment; no other may be used.

BOTTOM FISHING

Rules 1 through 5 same as POLLOCK.

- 6. Not more than two single hooks baited or one lure holding either a single hook or one treble hook allowed per line. Hand line may not be used unless rod or reel breaks and another is not available.
- 7. A 9 oz. lure is the heaviest lure permitted for bottom fishing. Any lure weighing more than 9 oz. is illegal.
- 8. In mackerel fishing only the fifth man may use a hand line; the hand line to hold a single lure with single hook or one treble hook.
- 9. Team members must cut bait and bait own hooks. (Man with gaff usually cuts bait.)
- 10. Coach may fish but must return fish to water.

These rules have been drawn up from years of experience, trial and error, and we hope that each member of each team and its coach accepts them in a spirit of good sportsmanship and friendly cooperation.

It is up to the teams to decide what kind of fishing they shall do during free portions of the Match. The boat captains can be consulted for their opinions, but the final decision rests with the teams. Once the decision has been made, the boat captains should be informed and then asked to proceed to the area which in their opinion holds the most promise for the specific type of fishing decided upon.

The boat captains should not themselves consult with the judges' boat about rules questions. If a team decides it must have a question answered before the next captains and coaches meeting, then the coach of the team should get on the radio and put the question directly to one of the judges.





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The boat captains should not themselves consult with the judges' boat about rules questions. If a team decides it must have a question answered before the next captains and coaches meeting, then the <u>coach</u> of the team should get on the radio and put the question directly to one of the judges.





FISHING MATCH PROCEDURES

- 1. All team members, coaches, and officials are required to attend the evening programs which start promptly at 8:30 p.m. at the Grand Hotel. FIFTY POINTS DEDUCTED FROM TEAM SCORE FOR EACH TEAM MEMBER OR COACH NOT IN ATTENDANCE.
- 2. At 7:30 (first night) team captains and coaches will meet with the officials in Hotel salon and at 8:00 the following two nights.
- 3. Following the last lecture each evening, announcements will be made concerning the next day's fishing grounds, species, time, etc.
- 4. The sole determining factor in designating fishing grounds, species and time will be the consensus of boat captains, crews, and the official judges of the Seminar. (Decisions are based on weather conditions, tides, evidence or abundance of individual species in individual areas and whatever will be best for the teams.)
- 5. Fishing may fall into four divisions depending on No. 4.
 - A. BLUEFIN or GIANT TUNA, chumming Soldier's Rip or trolling Tusket River.
 - B. POLLOCK, trolling with artificial lures along certain isolated ledges and shoal area.
 - C. COD, HADDOCK, HALIBUT, bottom fishing with jigs or bait in specified localities.
 - D. MACKEREL, fishing with small jigs in Tusket River.
- 6. There shall be only one kind of fishing permitted at a time: tuna, ground fishing or mackerel fishing, but no combination thereof.
- 7. If the fishing is unusually good for A, B, C or D in No. 5 the judges may decide to allow greater emphasis or entire effort on any species.
- 8. For the second and third day's fishing, the judges may allow each team to make its own decision regarding species to be sought and area to be fished. However, no boat will be allowed to go off alone. The minimum number of boats in a group to fish any area is three. Safety factors are involved. Further discussion at Captains' meetings.
- 9. Positively no guests allowed on team boats. Five qualified team members and one coach will constitute the maximum delegation from any one college (in all activities). If a photographer or writer wishes to board a team boat in order to obtain material he must receive permission from the judges and the team coach.
- 10. Immediately upon docking all fish will be weighed by the judges and recorded by the score keeper.
- 11. Fish will not be weighed in barrels. A crate will be weighed first and then the barrel of fish will be dumped into the crate. Tuna, of course, will be hauled up by chain mechanism.

SCORING RULES

- 1. One point per pound of fish regardless of species.
- 2. Team accumulating most points wins the Match and is awarded the Hulman Trophy for one year.
- 3. Team catching the largest fish is awarded the Crandall Trophy for one year.
- 4. The R.J. Schaefer International Trophy is awarded for one year to the group of schools (U.S. or Canada) gaining most points.

TEAM RULES

TUNA FISHING

- 1. Not more than two rods employed simultaneously. A rotation system is set up by the coach whereby each team member shares equally in time on the rods. Suggested time is 15 minutes per change. Team captains keep time. The two rods are situated on the sides of the angler's chair. One man is in the chair for 15 minutes and is assigned one rod. If the other rod hooks a fish the man in the chair hops out and allows his teammate to come into the chair.
- 2. The coach, boat captain, and crew members may not take the angler's place in the chair as an aid in fighting a tuna.
- 3. There are no restrictions concerning assistance given to the angler in the chair by his teammates, including handling of harness, rod and reel. If the angler fighting a fish becomes tired he may be substituted by a teammate. The fish will not be disqualified for scoring. Damaged tackle will not disqualify a fish.
- 4. Boat crews are responsible for chumming, rigging baits, gaffing the tuna, and advising the anglers at all times.

POLLOCK FISHING

- 1. Not more than 4 anglers (including coach) trolling at one time; 5th man gaffs the fish.
- 2. Rotation system is set up by the coach and timed by the team captain.
- 3. Team members may assist each other in any way possible.
- 4. The boat captain, and crew members may not fish, handle the gaff, remove hooks from fish, or place fish in barrel.

- 5. Coaches are allowed to fish. Their catches will count in scoring (This does not mean 5 rods per boat, however).
- 6. Boat crew may assist in choosing and rigging lures.
- 7. Lures are not to contain more than a single hook or a single treble hook. One lure per line. Hand line may not be used unless rod or reel breaks and another is not available.
- 8. In pollock fishing the use of tuna tackle is prohibited; otherwise no restrictions on rod, reel, or line of reasonable size.
- 9. A short-handed gaff is part of the boat's equipment; no other may be used.

BOTTOM FISHING

Rules 1 through 5 same as POLLOCK.

- 6. Not more than two single hooks baited or one lure holding either a single hook or one treble hook allowed per line. Hand line may not be used unless rod or reel breaks and another is not available.
- 7. A 9 oz. lure is the heaviest lure permitted for bottom fishing. Any lure weighing more than 9 oz. is illegal.
- 8. In mackerel fishing a single lure with single hook or one treble hook only may be used.
- 9. Team members must cut bait and bait own hooks. (Man with gaff usually cuts bait.)
- 10. Coach may fish and score points but total number of rods may not exceed four.

These rules have been drawn up from years of experience, trial and error, and we hope that each member of each team and its coach accepts them in a spirit of good sportsmanship and friendly cooperation.

It is up to the teams to decide what kind of fishing they shall do during free portions of the Match. The boat captains can be consulted for their opinions, but the final decision rests with the teams. Once the decision has been made, the boat captains should be informed and then asked to proceed to the area which in their opinion holds the most promise for the specific type of fishing decided upon.

The boat captains should not themselves consult with the judges' boat about rules questions. If a team decides it must have a question answered before the next captains and coaches meeting, then the <u>coach</u> of the team should get on the radio and put the question directly to one of the judges.





- 7. A 9 oz. lure is the heaviest lure permitted for bottom fishing. Any lure weighing more than 9 oz. is illegal.
- 8. In mackerel fishing a single lure with single hook or one treble hook only may be used.
- 9. Team members must cut bait and bait own hooks. (Man with gaff usually cuts bait.)
- 10. Coach may fish and score points but total number of rods may not exceed four.

These rules have been drawn up from years of experience, trial and error, and we hope that each member of each team and its coach accepts them in a spirit of good sportsmanship and friendly cooperation.

It is up to the teams to decide what kind of fishing they shall do during free portions of the Match. The boat captains can be consulted for their opinions, but the final decision rests with the teams. Once the decision has been made, the boat captains should be informed and then asked to proceed to the area which in their opinion holds the most promise for the specific type of fishing decided upon.

The boat captains should not themselves consult with the judges' boat about rules questions. If a team decides it must have a question answered before the next captains and coaches meeting, then the <u>coach</u> of the team should get on the radio and put the question directly to one of the judges.





FISHING MATCH PROCEDURES

- 1. All team members, coaches, and officials are required to attend the entire evening programs which start on scheduled time at the Grand Hotel. FIFTY POINTS DEDUCTED FROM TEAM SCORE FOR EACH TEAM MEMBER OR COACH NOT IN ATTENDANCE.
- 2. At 7:30 (first night) team captains and coaches will meet with the officials in Hotel Salon and at 8:00 the following two nights.
- 3. Following the last lecture each evening, announcements will be made concerning the next day's fishing grounds, species, time, etc.
- 4. The sole determining factor in designating fishing grounds, species and time will be the consensus of boat captains, crews, and the official judges of the Seminar. (Decisions are based on weather conditions, tides, evidence or abundance of individual species in individual areas and whatever will be best for the teams.)
- 5. Fishing may fall into four divisions depending on No. 4.
 - A. BLUEFIN or GIANT TUNA, chumming Soldier's Rip or trolling Tusket River.
 - B. POLLOCK, trolling with artificial lures along certain isolated ledges and shoal area.
 - C. COD, HADDOCK, HALIBUT, bottom fishing with jigs or bait in specified localities.
 - D. MACKEREL, fishing with small jigs in Tusket River.
- 6. There shall be only one kind of fishing permitted at a time: tuna fishing or ground fishing. Mackerel fishing is allowed while bottom fishing.
- 7. If the fishing is unusually good for A, B, C or D in No. 5 the judges may decide to allow greater emphasis or entire effort on any species.
- 8. For the second and third day's fishing, the judges may allow each team to make its own decision regarding species to be sought and area to be fished. However, no boat will be allowed to go off alone. The minimum number of boats in a group to fish any area is three. Safety factors are involved. Further discussion at Captains' meetings.
- 9. Positively no guests allowed on team boats. Five qualified team members and one coach will constitute the maximum delegation from any one college (in all activities). Photographers or writers who wish to board the Press boat in order to obtain material must receive permission from Chief Larry Boner.
- 10. Immediately upon docking all fish will be weighed by the weigh master and recorded by the score keeper.
- 11. Fish will not be weighed in barrels. A crate will be weighed first and then the barrel of fish will be dumped into the crate. Tuna, of course, will be hauled up by chain mechanism.

SCORING RULES

- 1. One point per pound of fish regardless of species.
- 2. Team accumulating most points wins the Match and is awarded the Hulman Trophy for one year.
- 3. Team catching the largest fish is awarded the Crandall Trophy for one year.
- 4. The R.J. Schaefer International Trophy is awarded for one year to the group of schools (U.S. or Canada) gaining most points.

TEAM RULES

TUNA FISHING

- 1. Not more than two rods employed simultaneously. A rotation system is set up by the coach whereby each team member shares equally in time on the rods. Suggested time is 15 minutes per change. Team captains keep time. The two rods are situated on the sides of the angler's chair. One man is in the chair for 15 minutes and is assigned one rod. If the other rod hooks a fish the man in the chair hops out and allows his teammate to come into the chair.
- 2. The coach, boat captain, and crew members may not take the angler's place in the chair as an aid in fighting a tuna.
- 3. There are no restrictions concerning assistance given to the angler in the chair by his teammates, including handling of harness, rod and reel. If the angler fighting a fish becomes tired he may be substituted by a teammate. The fish will not be disqualified for scoring. Damaged tackle will not disqualify a fish.
- 4. Boat crews are responsible for chumming, rigging baits, gaffing the tuna, and advising the anglers at all times.

POLLOCK FISHING

- 1. Not more than 4 anglers (including coach) trolling at one time; 5th man gaffs the fish.
- 2. Rotation system is set up by the coach and timed by the team captain.
- 3. Team members may assist each other in any way possible.
- 4. The boat captain, and crew members may not fish, handle the gaff, remove hooks from fish, or place fish in barrel.
- 5. Coaches are allowed to fish. Their catches will count in scoring. (This does not mean 5 rods per boat, however).

- 6. Boat crew may assist in choosing and rigging lures.
- 7. Lures are not to contain more than a single hook or a single treble hook. One lure per line. Hand line may not be used unless rod or reel breaks and another is not available.
- 8. In pollock fishing the use of tuna tackle is prohibited; otherwise no restrictions on rod, reel, or line of reasonable size.
- 9. A short-handed gaff is part of the boat's equipment; no other may be used.

BOTTOM FISHING

Rules 1 through 5 same as POLLOCK.

- 6. Not more than two single hooks baited or one lure holding either a single hook or one treble hook allowed per line. Hand line may not be used unless rod or reel breaks and another is not available.
- 7. A 9 oz. lure is the heaviest lure permitted for bottom fishing. Any lure weighing more than 9 oz. is illegal.
- 8. In mackerel fishing a single lure with single hook or one treble hook only may be used.
